










### Skills Tasmania - role and functions



Skills Tasmania's role in managing the Tasmanian training and workforce development system includes:

- administering the:
- Training and Workforce Development Act 2013 and monitoring the performance of the VET sector against Ministerial Priorities required under that Act
- TasTAFE (Skills and Training Business) Act 2021
- the apprenticeship and traineeship system
- purchasing training activity on behalf of the Government through TasTAFE (Deed of Purchasing Arrangement) and Skills Tasmania endorsed RTOs (contestable training program)
- partnering with industry and employers to identify current and future training needs, including through Industry Skills Compacts
- engaging with the Australian Government and state and territory governments on national skills policy funding and architecture
- providing strategy and policy advice in relation to the role of TasTAFE as the public provider.

### Training in the Energy and Construction sectors



- The Tasmanian Government is committed to developing a skilled workforce to grow the renewable energy and related sectors.
- \$16.1 million Energising Tasmania fund
- More than 4,000 places were created for training that includes:
  - Australian Maritime College new marine and offshore wind qualifications,
  - Aurecon electricity supply industry design and drafting qualification
  - Link Resources KRS' establish a Tasmanian Global Wind Organisation certified training provider and Future Energy Skills' expansion of solar electrical training.
  - TasTAFE Cert II in Renewable Energy
- BBAMZ funded to deliver virtual, augmented Immersive Skills
   Training Lab at Alanvale TasTAFE (through Industry Partnership Program)

### Clean Energy Centre of Excellence





- \$4m commitment to deliver clean energy trades facility in Burnie
- Commitment includes:
  - o campus upgrade
  - industry training needs analysis for NW renewable projects
  - development of learning resources in partnership with industry
- The Centre will bring together TasTAFE, UTAS, training providers and industry partners
- Industry partners include Master Builders Tasmania, Housing Industry and Civil Contractors Federation, NECA and Master Plumbers Association Tasmania.

### Tasmanian Clean Energy Skills Ministerial Advisory Board

- A Tasmanian Clean Energy Skills Ministerial Advisory Board (the Board) will be established.
- Will provide advice to the Minister for Skills and Training on the design and operating models for the Centre.
- The Board will develop a Project Delivery Plan that will:
  - Develop detailed project plan (timeline, budget, resources).
  - Design layout, equipment needs and structure
  - Establish training products to be delivered within the facility to inform fit out, size of building etc.
  - Identify the usage patterns for the facility.
  - Review possible redevelopment of existing public training assets and make clear recommendations on potential sites.
  - Agree operating model for the facility that outlines governance, access/use, asset management and equipment upgrades.

### Back with a splash!

- Due to a critical shortage of trained lifeguards, the Mole Creek Swimming Pool has been unable to operate for the past two years.
- Funding through TasNetworks' Community Grants Program will provide vital training for 14 lifeguards who will volunteer their time at the pool this summer.
- The volunteers conducted lifeguard training at the end of September and the pool is due to reopen at the start of December in time for the school holidays.
- Volunteers range in age from the youngest at 16, with remainder between 33 - 66 years of age.




### Reconciliation through song


